TIDBITS® REMEMBERS THE TITANIC

April 14 marks the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic on her maiden voyage from Southampton, England, to New York City. In memoriam, Tidbits brings you the facts and figures of this monumental tragedy, as well as information about the famous 1997 film produced by James Cameron.

- Constructed at the Harland and Wolff shipyard in Belfast, Ireland, the Titanic was the largest passenger steamship in the world at the time. Nearly 14,000 laborers contributed to her construction, at a cost of nearly \$8 million. (Compare this to the cost of making Cameron's 1997 movie "Titanic," with a production price tag of over \$200 million.)
- The ship was four city blocks long and weighed 46,329 tons. Three million rivets held the hull together. On launch day, 44,000 pounds (19,958 kg) of soap, grease and oil were required to slide the massive craft into the water. Twenty-nine boilers fueled the 159 coal-burning furnaces.
- The coolers were stocked with 75,000 pounds (34,019 kg) of fresh meat, 11,000 pounds (4,989 kg) of fresh fish, 36,000 oranges, 40,000 eggs, 6,000 pounds (2,721 kg) of butter and 1,500 gallons (6,819 1) of milk. The cupboards were filled with 12,000 dinner plates, 3,000 teacups, 300 nutcrackers, 6,000 tablecloths and 45,000 napkins.





- Although designed and licensed to carry 3,500 passengers, only 2,223 people were on board, including millionaire John Jacob Astor, mining magnate Benjamin Guggenheim and Macy's department store owners Isidor and Ida Straus. The most elegant firstclass suites were priced at \$4,350, which translates to about \$75,000 in today's money. Second-class fares were \$1,750 (\$24,000 today), and third class steerage was available for \$30, about \$350 today. First-class passengers ate their meals from fine china edged in 22k gold
- The final evening meal served on the Titanic consisted of 11 different courses, including raw oysters as an hors d'oeuvre, cream of barley soup, cold asparagus vinaigrette and roast duckling.
- Four days into the Atlantic crossing, the ship struck an iceberg, one estimated at 500,000 tons, with 50 feet (15.2 m) above the water and seven-eighths of its bulk below. Icebergs are typically at their worst during April, because warmer spring temperatures melt the thick ice of the sea that has held the icebergs in place, releasing them to float free. The ship's wireless operators received seven telegraphed ice warnings that fateful night. The final message, placed under a paperweight, was never delivered to those on the ship's bridge. The ice field the Titanic encountered was close to 80 miles (128 km) long.
- The ship was equipped with lifeboats for 1,178 of the more than 2,200 people on board. The death toll was 1,517, of which only 306 bodies were recovered. Although a lifeboat could hold 65 people, the first one was launched with only 28 on board. Had the crew loaded the existing lifeboats to capacity, 500 more lives could have been saved.
- The original plans called for an additional 12 lifeboats on the deck, but the White Star Line's management ditched the idea, claiming the deck would "look too cluttered."
- It was not a large gash in the hull of the Titanic that caused her to sink; rather the force of the impact caused the steel rivets to pop, buckling the steel plates of the hull. Based on the ship's speed of about 22 knots, if the iceberg had been sighted only 30 seconds sooner, the collision could have been avoided. With one knot equal to 1.516 mph (2.44 km/h), 22 knots was close to the highest speed the ship had ever reached.

'Surprise Inside' **Easter Eggs**

Ready, set, think Easter! Put aside chores and to-do lists for an afternoon and make these colorfully decorated "surprise inside" Easter eggs with your family.

You'll need the simplest of supplies: real eggshell halves or plastic eggs that twist open in half, bright gift-wrap tissue paper, household white glue and your children's creativity.

Come Easter morning, friends and family will anticipate cracking open these dazzling eggs because there's a special surprise inside each one! To get started, save your eggshells. When a recipe calls for

eggs, carefully crack the eggs in half, empty the contents for the recipe and rinse out the matching eggshells with soap and water. Set them aside to dry thoroughly, making sure you keep the pairs together. Or, simply use inexpensive empty plastic eggs in a variety of sizes from discount and dollar stores. Place a small charm, toy, coins or a strip of paper with a saying,

poem or kind thought inside one of the halves of each eggshell pair. For example, "For an egg-stra special friend whose sense of humor cracks me up!"

Now it's time to put Humpty Dumpty back together again. Find the matching eggshell half and tape or glue the two pieces together. Don't worry if there are gaps where small pieces of the shell may have broken.

Brush white household glue one section at a time on the eggshell and place small squares of cut gift-wrap tissue paper on the glue. Overlap the tissue squares as you cover the entire egg, including the open gaps, if there are any. Paint a final coat of glue over the tissue-covered egg. Let dry.

The glue will become invisible, revealing a colorful mosaic of tissue shapes. If an egg is designated for a particular person, glue on a small nametag.

Arrange your brightly decorated eggs in an Easter basket and enjoy them as a table centerpiece this month. On Easter morning crack open the eggs to reveal the surprises!







- The New York Times Best Seller list was first published on April 9, 1942. Since that time, only eight authors have managed to have books place No. 1 on both the fiction and nonfiction lists. Those who have accomplished that feat include Ernest Hemingway, Jimmy Buffett, William Styron, Dr. Seuss and John Steinbeck.

- It took only two hours and 40 minutes for the Titanic to sink after striking the iceberg. The ship that responded immediately to the distress calls was the Carpathia, 58 miles (93 km) away. Unfortunately, it took four hours for the ship to reach the Titanic. The Carpathia carried the 700-plus survivors into New York harbor, where the ship was met by over 40,000 people.
- Most of the victims froze to death rather than drowned in the 28°F (-2°C) water, where death occurred in as little as 15 minutes. When James Cameron produced his 1997 movie blockbuster, he instructed cast members on the stages of hypothermia in order to make their scenes more realistic. Cameron advised his cast, "It's supposedly a very peaceful feeling." The actors' icy frozen hair was created by coating hair with colored wax.
- Of the 306 bodies recovered, 150 were never claimed. Those unclaimed were buried in Halifax, Nova Scotia.
- Captain Edward Smith had plans of retiring after safely navigating the Titanic to New York City, wrapping up 38 years with the White Star Line.
- The wreck of the Titanic was discovered in September 1985, on an expedition led by Robert Ballard. She lay approximately 400 miles (644 km) off the coast of Newfoundland, 1,191 miles (1,917 km) from New York City, 12,460 feet (3,798 m) below the ocean's surface. The bow and the stern were 1,970 feet (600 m) apart. During Ballard's expedition, more than 20,000 photos were shot in four days.
- Producer James Cameron made 12 trips to the actual wreckage site to conduct research for his 1997 film. His movie contains actual footage from these trips, shot on location. A replica of the ship was constructed for the film, and it was sunk in an immense tank filled with 17 million gallons of water. A hydraulic lift was used to tilt the tank and raise and lower the ship.

- America's first vending machines were found in New York City train stations; they dispensed gum.
- The European sturgeon (also known as the beluga sturgeon) is the source of the highly coveted beluga caviar, which is the world's most expensive, bringing up to \$5,000 per pound. This sturgeon can live more than 100 years and is the largest freshwater fish in the world; the record holder, caught in 1827, was 24 feet long and weighed 3,460 pounds.
- In a 1982 issue of the magazine American Film, a writer named Chuck Ross claimed that he retyped the screenplay to the 1942 film "Casablanca," changing only the title and one of the character's names, and submitted it to 217 agencies. Of the 85 who responded, only eight recognized it as "Casablanca," though it seemed familiar to another 25. Three of the agencies thought it might be commercially viable, while one thought it should be turned into a novel. The Oscar-wining screenplay was rejected outright by 38 of the agencies.

In Aug1894. John H. Koyle experienced a dream in which he was visited by a figure from another world. The visitor showed Koyle an ancient "Nephite" mine. The rooms contained treasure of an extinct civilization. Koyle was instructed to open a mine and extract gold for the welfare of "his" people. Specific instructions were given for the mine development. The riches would be found and released during a time of world crisis. The name "Relief Mine" was attached to the project. In 1909 the Koyle Mining Company was formed with 114,000 shares of stock issued at \$1.00 per share.

Koyle's dreams continued. He predicted the First World War and the economic crash of October, 1929. He foresaw "horseless carriages" bigger than railroad cars going down the road at great speeds. John H. Koyle died 17 May 1949 in Payson.

The mine continued in fits and starts under the leadership of Quayle Dixon for another twenty-three years. In 1961, a new company, The Relief Mine Company, succeeded the Koyle Mining Company.

- Several items recovered from the wreckage now reside in a Philadelphia museum, including Mrs. John Jacob Astor's lifebelt, a menu from the dining room, a deck chair and a piece of wood from a lifeboat.
- The youngest passenger on the ship was Millvina Dean, just nine weeks old. Her parents were emigrating to Wichita, Kansas, where they had family and friends. Millvina, along with her mother and brother, were some of the first steerage passengers to be loaded into lifeboats. Her 25-year-old father did not survive. Millvina was also the last living survivor, passing away in May 2009, at the age of 97. Her ashes were scattered off the Southampton dock, where the Titanic had been launched. Strangely enough, her brother died on the 80th anniversary of the sinking.

LANDMARKS OF THE WORLD: LEANING TOWER OF PISA

One of the most easily recognized landmarks in the world is the Leaning Tower of Pisa, perhaps Italy's favorite tourist attraction. Is it in danger of eventually tipping over? Follow along and see!

- The Torre Pendente di Pisa, or Bell Tower of Pisa, stands adjacent to the Cathedral of Pisa in the Piazza dei Miracoli (Square of Miracles). It is the third oldest building in the cathedral square, after the cathedral itself and the baptistery.
- Construction began on the Tower in 1173. By the time the first three stories were completed, the Tower had already begun to lean. It's no small wonder it happened, since the city of Pisa itself takes its name from a Greek word meaning "marshy land." The Tower's foundations, only 9.85 feet (3 m) deep, were laid on soft ground made up of clay, fine sand and shells, no match for a 14,500-ton weight. In fact, there are several other towers throughout the city that lean, and the cathedral and baptistery are sinking as well.
- Work stopped on the Tower after only five years and three stories. The architects and engineers hoped that by delaying the construction, the clay would settle and harden, something that didn't happen. Construction did not resume for nearly 100 years, until 1272, when an architect attempted to correct the lean with a design that made the remaining stories shorter on the uphill side. Four additional floors were added, and the extra weight of these caused the Tower to sink further and lean even more. The construction halted yet again in 1278.
- The seventh story was finally completed in 1319, and in 1372 the top bell chamber was added. There are seven bells in the Tower, all tuned to the pitches of the musical scale.

Attic Vents Present a Pesky **Problem**

Q: Recently, I found that sparrows had built a nest not just under the eaves of my house, but inside the crawlspace under the roof. I had pest control remove the nest, and now I plan to seal up any gaps or openings under the eaves or leading into the attic. How best do I go about this? -- John C., Framingham, Mass.

A: You don't want to seal up every opening in the attic and crawlspace area, as many of the openings play an important role in maintaining the health of your home.

The spaces between the exterior and interior living area of a house -- attics, crawlspaces, the gaps between the outside wall and the interior framing and drywall -- make up what's known as a home's "envelope." Airflow into and out of this envelope is as important as the other components you'll often find inside, such as insulation.

Home plans provide for open vents spaced around the exterior of the house, which allow air to flow naturally into and out of the envelope. This constantly moving air keeps the space between your living area and the outside of the house from getting too hot

or too cold, and more importantly, keeps moisture from becoming a problem. Excess humidity within the envelope can, over time cause some very expensive problems, including mold. Of course, you don't want pests using these vents to move into

your home, because they, too, can cause quite a bit of damage. To protect the crawlspace and the health of your home, find and note all of the openings and vents in the eaves and soffits, the crawlspace and attic, and the basement or lower crawlspace of your home. Note the condition of each: is a vent in place? Is there just an opening with no protective vent? Or does the opening look like a damaged area rather than an intentionally placed opening? Once you have that diagram, then you can purchase what you need to install proper vent covers that will enable airflow while discouraging pests, and repair any exterior damage before interior damage becomes a problem.

Even with protective measures in place, you still will need to inspect the area at least twice a year, typically spring and fall, for evidence of animals or other pests trying to make your home their

Smoked Ham with Fresh Strawberry Sauce

Perfect for a buffet any time of year. We created this impressive glazed ham for winter entertaining, but it has become an Easter favorite as well.

- 1 (12-pound) smoked whole ham, fully cooked
- 3 pints strawberries
- 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 jar (10- to 12-ounce) orange marmalade Radish sprouts or watercress sprigs, for garnish

1. Remove skin and trim some fat from smoked whole ham, leaving about 1/4 inch fat. With knife, score fat covering on ham crosswise, just through to the meat, into 1-inch-wide

strips. Place ham on rack in large roasting pan (about 17 by 11 1/2 inches). Insert meat thermometer into center of ham, being careful that pointed end does not touch bone. Bake ham in 325 F oven 3 to 3 1/2 hours until thermometer reaches 140 F (15 to 18 minutes per pound). If ham browns too quickly, cover with a foil tent.

2. About 30 minutes before ham is done, prepare strawberry sauce: Reserve 1 pint strawberries for garnish. Hull remaining strawberries. In 3-quart saucepan, mash strawberries. Stir in brown sugar, cornstarch, salt and orange marmalade; cook over medium heat until mixture thickens slightly and boils, stirring frequently.

3. To serve, place ham on warm large platter. Arrange radish sprouts and reserved whole strawberries around ham. Serve

LEANING TOWER (continued)

- In 1990, after 20 years of studies on how to stabilize the structure, the Tower was closed to the public and corrective reconstruction began. Because of its importance to Pisa's tourism industry, the engineers wanted to keep the "lean." The Tower was straightened slightly — 18 inches (46 cm) — by removing soil from underneath the higher side. This action brought it to its position from 1838. It was not reopened to the public for nearly 12 years, at which time it was declared stable for at least the next 300 years.
- In 2008, the Tower was further stabilized and stopped moving for the first time in its history. Its current tilt is more than 16.5 feet (5 m) off perpendicular.
- If you're interested in climbing to the top of the Tower, there are 297 steps to the bell chamber. Its height on the high side is 185.93 feet (56.67 m), and it is 183.27 feet (55.86 m) on the low side, not really a very tall structure. Compare it to the St. Louis Arch at 630 feet (192 m). The walls are 13.42 feet (4.09 m) thick at the base and 8.14 feet (2.48 m) thick at the top.
- The world very nearly did not have the Leaning Tower to enjoy. During World War II, American soldiers discovered enemy snipers using the structure as an observation post and were ordered to destroy all buildings that could pose such a potential threat. Hundreds of buildings were blown up as a result. Due to an enemy retreat, the Tower was saved at the very last minute.

IT'S TAX TIME!

As the annual income tax deadline draws near, here are some facts about this dreaded subject!

- In American colonial times, the mother country England taxed its colonists on nearly everything, from newspapers, playing cards and documents to paper, paint and tea. The famous Boston Tea Party occurred in 1773, when 116 colonists dressed up as Native Americans and boarded three ships anchored in Boston Harbor. The ships' entire cargo of tea was thrown overboard, 90,000 pounds (40,823 kg) of tea in 342 crates. The value in today's money would be equal to about \$1 million.
- After the American Revolutionary War, Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton needed a way to pay off the debt created by the war. His solution was the instigation of a "sin tax," a tax on those items viewed by society as immoral. The Whiskey Tax of 1791 levied a 28-percent tax on every gallon of whiskey. In 1794, it was expanded to other "luxuries," such as carriages, sugar, snuff and salt.





Understanding Breast Calcifications

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: The receptionist at my doctor's office called to give me the report on a mammogram I had taken. She said that it showed calcifications and that the doctor wanted it repeated in six months. Why? Are calcifications indications of cancer? If they are, I'd like to get this taken care of immediately. I am becoming a nervous wreck thinking about this. -- H.M.

ANSWER: When tests don't provide a definite answer, everyone suffers -- the patient, the doctor of the patient and the doctor who interpreted the test.

Calcifications are the perfect example. They're calcium specks. When the doctor interpreting the mammogram sees them, he or she bases their importance on their number, their shape, their size and the pattern they make. With those criteria, the doctor usually can say whether they indicate

Noncancerous calcifications might result from a bump to the breast to which you paid little attention. Or a minor breast infection could have caused them.

If the doctor feels that evidence points more in the direction of cancer, then he or she will ask for an immediate biopsy. If the doctor feels more certain that they are not cancer signs but is not completely certain about that call, a repeat examination at a later date is a reasonable position to take. Neither the interpreting doctor nor your personal doctor would ask for a delay if there was any chance that the inaction would harm your health.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My thighs are loaded with cellulite. What is it, and how can I get rid of it? -- M.T.

ANSWER: Cellulite is beneath-the-skin fat that forms small puckers due to crisscrossing fibers similar to but not the same as scar-tissue fibers. The fiber-puckered fat gives the involved skin a lumpy-bumpy appearance.

Laser treatments, radiofrequency wave treatments and ultrasound have been used for removing cellulite. These are cosmetic procedures and likely are not covered by insurance. Innumerable creams are advertised for cellulite reduction, but I can't tell you if they work. I would be cautious about trying any that are costly. Weight loss makes cellulite less obvious. You are best served by consulting a dermatologist.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: For the past several days, my left eyelid has been twitching. There's no pain. It does not affect my vision. Does it mean anything? -- T.P.

ANSWER: Not usually. Eyelid twitches result from spasms of muscles controlling eyelid movement. It's intermittent and lasts for a few days, at most. Fatigue, stress and caffeine have been implicated as causes. I have had such twitching, at times when I was neither tired nor stressed nor drinking caffeine.

If the twitching is bothersome, soak a washcloth in warm water and apply it to the closed eyelid. If twitching lasts longer than a week or two, see the family doctor.



IT'S TAX TIME! (continued)

- Folks have been paying taxes in some form since ancient times. The first written records date back to Egypt, when grain, livestock or oils were used as payment.
- When the War of 1812 incurred more debt, the government initiated taxes on gold, silverware, jewelry and watches, an act that remained in place for five years. When that tax was repealed, the government relied on tariffs on imported goods to fund the country.
- The nation's first actual income tax was implemented to fund the Civil War in 1862. Those earning annual income between \$800 and \$10,000 paid income taxes of 3 percent, while those above \$10,000 paid a higher rate. The inheritance tax was also introduced.
- The office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue was established the same year. But the income tax was repealed once the debt had been eliminated.
- The 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution in 1913 gave Congress "power to lay and collect taxes on incomes" on a permanent basis. The first Form 1040 was created that year. Because of generous exemptions and deductions, in 1913, less than 1 percent of citizens paid income tax at the rate of 1 percent of net income.
- In 1913, the U.S. tax code manual consisted of 400 pages. Forty years later it was 14,000 pages. Another 40 years brought the document to 26,300 pages. It seems to be getting much more complicated as the years go by — the 2011 tax code contained 72,536 pages!
- The complexity of the system has grown a lot since that first Form 1040. In 1990, there were 402 various IRS tax forms. By 2002, that number had jumped to 526, and today there are more than 800 different forms.
- Most of us complain about our taxes, but some just plain refuse to comply. Movie star Wesley Snipes began serving a three-year prison sentence in December 2010 for failing to file tax returns, in debt to the government for \$17 million. The government seized the assets of singer Willie Nelson to collect the \$16 million in back taxes he owed. Baseball great Pete Rose failed to claim income from his autograph signings and spent five months in prison for this oversight. In 1973, the political career of Vice President Spiro Agnew ended when he resigned after being charged with tax evasion.

Prosthetic Limb Study

The House Committee on Veterans Affairs asked the VA Office of Inspector General to review and evaluate how services are being provided to veterans who have had amputations. The study was limited to 838 veterans discharged from active service after Operation Enduring Freedom/Operation Iraqi Freedom/Operation New Dawn.

- Here's what it found: -- The majority were between the ages of 22 and 25, enlisted
- male veterans. -- The rates of some disorders increased after discharge. Anxiety disorders rose from 42 percent to 61 percent. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder rates increased from 31 percent to 58 percent. Alcohol disorders rose from 7 percent to 11 percent. Drug disorders, however, and adjustment disorders decreased.
- --Veterans with upper limb amputations didn't fare as well as

those with lower limb amputations in terms of psychosocial adjustment, physical ability and prosthetic satisfaction.

--Veterans with amputations and prostheses are "significant users" of Department of Veterans Affairs health services, and not just for the prostheses: 99 percent use VA health care for all medical needs.

The comments at the end of the report are telling. One veteran commented on the lengthy process to get a prosthesis made by an outside vendor and have the VA approve and pay for it. Another makes his own repairs to his prosthesis to cut through the VA red tape. Another veteran goes out of his way to avoid using VA care, saying most of the staff doesn't understand upper limb amputations. Some veterans are waiting six months for an appointment and then have to travel long distances. Another has had a clothing issue for years and hadn't been able to get help until the OIG stepped






